












Dear Friends and Supporters,

As we reflect on another transformative year at Youth Speaks, I'm filled with gratitude for the incredible journey we've shared. Our mission to empower young voices through culture has never been more vital, and your unwavering support has been the cornerstone of our success in a time of uncertainty.

Between 2023-2024, we've made significant strides in living our values, both in how we serve young poets and how we operate as an organization. We've increased our base pay, ensuring no team member earns less than \$70,000 annually. We've invested in wellness policies, team bonding, and professional development. These aren't just perks; they're a testament to our commitment to nurturing the very people who nurture our youth.

Our impact extends far beyond our walls. From the Bay Area to Butte County and beyond, we've scaled our programs to serve 3,700 students in Bay Area schools and welcomed 6,343 arts audiences back into theaters and cultural spaces through our live performances and events. We provided 294 hours of public storytelling workshops at no cost, regranted \$740,000 unrestricted funds with our partners at the California Arts Council, and provided more than \$40,000 in stipends directly to youth artists here at home in the Bay Area, and in our national Brave New Voices network. We're not just practicing art. We're investing in pathways of economic power for young culture bearers across the U.S., and building an infrastructure around this essential value.

As we look to the future, we remain committed to learning from our rich 28-year history while staying responsive to the dynamic dreams and questions that young people, and these times, are asking. We won't stop.

Your support makes all of this possible. Thank you for believing in the power of youth voices and poetic will, and the incredible things that happen when we bring them together.

Brave New Voices changed my life.

I've always loved to write but when I was about 15, I started taking myself more seriously. I spent hours on Youtube watching videos of HBO's Def Poetry Jam when I found what seemed was a spoken word poetry competition for young people like me it was called Brave New Voices.

I participated in Brave New Voices four years in a row: in San Francisco, Chicago, Atlanta, and Philadelphia.

There's something spiritual that happens at Brave New Voices. It's the only way I can describe it. I feel the movement, the energy being created. And because I knew that many of my people back home in Michigan would never get the chance to experience Brave New Voices (BNV), I made it my mission then to take the spirit of BNV with me everywhere I went: in the way I would love my neighbor, in the way I wanted to pour back into my community of Flint, in the way that I would take my craft seriously, because I knew this would be my tool that I'd use to change the world.

I was devastated when I left for college. Brave New Voices was all I had throughout high school and I wouldn't be able to participate. As a McNair Schölar, I researched the power of arts-education pedagogies in the prison system. I studied the power of building poetic communities and creating safe spaces inside prisons, like those that were created for me at Brave New Voices, and its impact on those who are incarcerated. I never let go of Brave New Voices. In 2019, I graduated. The next year, I had another chance to get free and applied for Youth Speaks/Brave New Voices Future Corps Fellowship program, a national arts leadership training and fellowship program for Brave New Voices' national alumni network.

After my Future Corps Fellowship, I went on to apply to become the Brave New Voices Festival Slam Coordinator, and eventually the Festival's Future Corps Fellowship Director. In 2024, I am this year's Brave New Voices Festival Co-Festival Director. My heart is truly full.

It's hard to put into words how BNV has shaped me, and continues to shape me. I know how I felt as a young 15 year old girl experiencing my first Brave New Voices. I know the love that was poured into me. I know that the younger poets and writers who come to BNV today are our future. I am them. They deserve to be poured into. They deserve to be shown the possibilities that poetry has to offer. It doesn't stop on a stage: the world is their stage. They deserve to know that. They deserve to know that the point of Brave New Voices was never the point. The point was always our poetry, and the poetry was, is, and will always be the language that connects us and a community that frees us.



SCHOOL-BASED RESIDENCIES & SCHOOL VISIT ASSEMBLY PROGRAM

Residencies are high-level creative writing and performance poetry workshops at local schools. Youth Speaks' Teaching Artists partner with classroom teachers in multiple subjects to engage students in arts integrated, Spoken Word Hip Hop pedagogies.

CREATIVE WRITING & PERFORMANCE WORKSHOPS



This year, 41 youth writers in our after-school creative writing and performance workshop program made history as they honored literary ancestor Dr. Maya Angelou at the unveiling of San Francisco's newest landmark, a sculpture by artist Lava Thomas honoring the legacy and impact of San Francisco poet, Dr. Maya Angelou (1928-2014). Through a year-long creative writing and performance workshop series, youth in our "Maya Did It First" series studied the writings, speeches and autobiography of Dr. Maya Angelou. Her literary descendants, created and presented original performance poems to celebrate the monumental occasion.

ARTISTIC PRESENTATION & CREATIVE EXPRESSION



Youth Speaks' monthly open mics are famous for providing emerging young writers, emcees and performers the opportunity to share and find creative community in a safe, celebratory, and affirming environment. This year, we hosted open mics in San Francisco and Oakland to meet the demand from students and teachers on both sides of the bridge.



For nearly three decades, Youth Speaks' Annual Teen Poetry Slam has been a launching pad for spoken word poetry. This Olympic-style competition invites young Bay Area poets to showcase their talent in three-minute performances across preliminary, semi-final, and final rounds. Each year, the six top-scoring finalists earn the honor of representing the Bay Area at the annual Brave New Voices Festival and Convening, an annual celebration of extraordinary young writers and performers from across the globe.



The Verses & Vibes showcase was re-envisioned by young emcees, lyricists, and teams of poets wanting a platform to showcase, perform, and spit their truths in community with other young artists throughout the Bay Area without competition. This showcase brings together the school spirit of Youth Speaks' Unified School District Poetry Festival and lyrical cyphers of our MC Olympics events into one spectacular evening of poetry and Hip Hop.



SPOKES, Youth Speaks youth advisory board, is made up of ten handselected Bay Area youth invited to grow as cultural organizers and arts practitioners by using their leadership skills to make the world more just, liberatory, and fun for their communities.






A year ago, Youth Speaks launched a new initiative called Power Lab as a vehicle to activate the next generation of cultural organizers committed to studying and developing deep narratives to leverage the power of culture to influence policy, combat disinformation, and heal civic trauma. The first program to launch from the Power Lab suite of activities; infrastructure and platforms is **Public Poets**, a 9-month fellowship program that launched September 2024. As we look ahead to 2025-2026, Public Poets will train young and emerging writers and story-based artists ages 16-26 to act as essential and catalytic shapers of economic, political and cultural change. The program's Artistic Leadership and Power Building model builds on Youth Speaks' 17 years of co-desgining, implementing and evaluating cultural action labs and service projects across the country.

BACKCROUND

Our project, *Information Pending Revolution*, challenged the prevailing narrative that youth are not credible messengers in public health communication. Drawing inspiration from influential youth activists like Mari Copeny and Jamie Margolin, we celebrated the transformative power of young voices in driving meaningful social change. This initiative empowered youth poets to create and share original, solutions-oriented content developed during narrative change workshops. To amplify their impact, we explored innovative distribution strategies to enhance visibility and engagement across social media, ensuring these voices reach and inspire a broader audience.

CULTURE MOVES FASTER THAN POLICY

OUTCOMES

- Established an ongoing partnership with the California Office of Community Partnerships and Strategic Communication to support statewide initiatives.
- Built alliances with five community-based organizations across key regions, including Sacramento, Los Angeles, Central Valley, Fresno, and broader areas throughout California.
- Amplified creative efforts to address pressing climate justice issues such as extreme
 heat and water conservation, fostering statewide awareness and action.
- Reached thousands through a targeted social media campaign featuring five posts, effectively raising public understanding of climate resilience and equity.




RESEARCH

It is essential now more than ever to not let up on talking about mental wellness, resilience and recovery, a pressing issue that continues to challenge youth communities across the United States. As Gen Z and Gen Alpha youth navigate the complexities of our world, effective storytelling becomes paramount in fostering trust, identifying resilience, and building youth cultural power to act. By harnessing the power of narrative to blend data, evidence, and personal stories, Youth Speaks' most recent research project serves as a timely catalyst and call-to-action to create a more inclusive Narrative ecosystem, where the voices of youth writers, poets and storytellers are core to ongoing social change efforts.

RESEARCH

BACKGROUND

In the spring of 2024, Youth Speak's Recovery Pending Revolution (CPR3) campaign was launched to assess the effectiveness of dissemination efforts augmented by a social media influencer and a youth media partner. This initiative was a continuation of Youth Speaks' narrative change research project "Survival Pending Revolution" carried out in September 2023 and motivated by what Youth Speaks and University of California San Francisco Medical Center saw as a gap in culture-forward public health content that youth of color felt they can trust.

OUR RESEARCH

Over 7 months, we conducted a research partnership with UCSF and the California Department of Public Health, and public health researchers at UC Berkeley and UC Irvine. It aimed to address pandemic recovery for communities and enhance preparedness for future emergencies by highlighting the grassroots communications potential of youth poets of color.

PROBLEM

MENTAL DIS-EASE

Even though people are talking more about mental health and the stigma is decreasing, trust in medical, government, and big institutions among youth of color is still very low. Dominant stories suggest that Gen Z youth of color aren't resilient and don't take charge of their recovery and wellness. These views miss out on the community-driven solutions and support networks that Gen Z youth of color build and depend on during tough times.





Gen Z is significantly more likely to report experiencing anxiety and depression compared to previous generations.



84% of Gen Zers believe mental health is a crisis in the United States, with **65%** reporting at least one mental health problem in the past two years.







YOUTH OF COLOR, SOCIAL MEDIA & DIGITAL SPACE

Youth Speaks' pedagogy has evolved to fit the needs of young people in classrooms, theaters and communities. Youth with limited or no access to arts programming in their local communities benefit from Youth Speaks' digital presence and exposure to free livestream arts education programs like our Under 21 Open Mic, After School Creative Writing Workshops and Teen Poetry Slam. By leveraging digital tools and strategies, we seek to enhance the effectiveness and reach of our programs, ensuring that young people are engaged, educated, and empowered to foster empathy in their communities. We're learning that not only are young people "on social," youth, especially youth of color, are extraordinary bridgers of technological innovation and cultural expression. We're exploring how Youth Speaks can support building back in-person arts-based experiences, while evovling with technologies that that many of our youth views as enriching aspects of their daily lives.

Around 95% of young people between the ages of 13–17 use at least one social media platform. More than one-third of those report using social media nearly constantly.



Despite their passion for political issues like climate change and gun control, only 19% of young people trust the government to do what is right.¹

Survey data of Millennials and Gen Zers demonstrate a disconnect between young adults and government that is most acutely prevalent for individuals from communities of color and households roughly below the median income.

We ask them to not be afraid of their stories. We promise we won't be.








TIMELINE of Youth Speaks
